A Message for Kindergarten Parents

- Kindle excitement about Early Years. Visit your school and meet your child's teacher.
- Invite new school friends home to play and help your child build strong friendships.
- Never forget safety. Teach your child safety rules- whether walking or riding.
- Discuss what your child will learn in school shapes, numbers, letters, words, etc.
- Explore your neighbourhood together. Talk about the world you live in.
- Review the good behaviour expected of your child, such as following expectations and taking turns.
- **G** Get involved at your child's school. Visit often, attend all our programmes and volunteer in the classroom.
- Answer your child's questions about school. Reassure your child that school is fun and each day is a new adventure.
- Read to your child daily. Visit bookstores together.
- Turn every day into a learning experience. Let your child help you with everyday tasks.
- Encourage your child to eat well and get enough sleep. Be healthy and rested for school each day!
- Notice the new things your child is learning to do. Reinforce your child's progress with praise.



THE EARLY YEARS CURRICULUM

At Delhi Public School, Greater Noida the curriculum for excellence embodies children's learning from 3 to 18 years of age. All indoor and outdoor learning evolves from the interests expressed by our children. Our activities, experiences and environments are all designed to ensure the children are fully engaged in their learning.

THE DAILY PROGRAMME AND LEARNING CENTERS

Our Early Years classrooms are designed as learning centers that provide students with exciting and interesting experiences to practise, enrich and enhance their learning.

Our Learning Centers are:

- Linguistics Corner
- Mathematical Corner
- Curiosity Corner
- Art Corner
- Reading Corner





When children enter the classroom in the morning, a variety of activities await them. During the morning children will be given the freedom to explore the various learning activities and interest centers that have been prepared before their arrival. These centers are changed from week to week, day to day and sometimes hour to hour depending on curriculum requirements.

Each day is a special day! Enough interest centers and activities are going on at one time that the child is motivated by knowing that they are there; always something new or some way that it's new. But always enough things remain the same to provide the security and comfort of familiarity. Learning centers provide maximum challenge to the body and mind.

A teacher is always nearby to lend support when needed—to help the child, answer a question, offer a challenging statement or make a suggestion in keeping with each particular child's current level of achievement, interest, ability and needs.

THE YEARLY PROGRAMME

Reading/Language/Writing

We follow Jolly Phonics which is widely recognised as the most effective way to teach children to read and write English.



The Early Years programme provides appropriate activities that foster each child's emergent literacy. Emergent literacy does not refer to any specific reading skills. Emergent literacy in a broad sense refers to an overall attitude and therefore our approach toward literacy and the development of a communication system. Literacy is not a product but includes the dynamic process of inter-relating thinking/view, listening, speaking, reading and writing.

In Early Years, each child will pass through a variety of stages at different times as they are developmentally ready to move to the next stage. Stages consist of the scribbling stage, random lettering, copying, letter strings and then developmental spelling. You will see your child pass through several of these stages this year in Early Years. One of our main goals in the Early Years programme is to build a strong foundation for the continued development of listening, speaking, reading and writing.





MATH OUTLINE FOR THE YEAR

We follow the ELPS (Experience, Spoken Language, Picture, Written Symbols) approach in teaching. This approach is integrated into the mathematical teaching and learning process to give children comprehensive mathematics experiences considering the nature and cognitive demands of the tasks and skills.



Our curriculum is aligned with experiential learning standards. Where children learn the mathematical abstract concepts through concrete experiences and gradually move from the concrete to pictorial to abstract notions.

Weekly topics will be covered during our mathematics time as well as meaningful hands-on experiences that will be integrated into topics and literature throughout the day. Math concepts will be taught through small groups, large groups, projects and learning centres each week.

HOMEWORK

LEARNING IS

As children enter Early Years, they are eager and ready to learn. Early Years' homework lays the foundation for good work habits in later years. Furthermore, positive homework helps establish the home-school connection and involves parents as partners in their child's daily learning experiences.

Early Years' homework directly relates to experiences and activities going on in the classroom. We will be

sending homework with the children periodically. This will relate to and build upon what we are learning at school.

EARLY YEARS CLASSROOM MANAGEMENT PLAN

We will be spending the first few weeks of school working to develop our classroom community and family. When the children establish the expectations for the year, they take ownership and pride in their classroom.

Do not worry if there is no written work happening. We are writing our expectations!

At Delhi Public School, Greater Noida:

- 1. Students are Responsible, Respectful, Safe and Help each other!
- 2. Students are Courteous to each other speak and deal with kindness!
- 3. Students challenge themselves—explore and learn to make themselves smarter!

Behaviour expectations that will be included in the children's list:

- 1. Listen and follow directions.
- 2. Keep your hands and feet in your own space.
- 3. Raise your hand to wait for your turn.
- 4. Move safely from place to place.
- 5. Mindful behaviour is expected in the halls and stairways.
- 6. Respect and keep school property safe.





EVALUATION/ASSESSMENT

Observing and assessing children helps us focus on their strengths and identify their weak areas. Continuous assessment and tracking monthly progress of each child helps to adopt and modify *teaching* learning strategies and ensures that learning needs and gaps are addressed.



To assess children's learning observations, anecdotal records, portfolios and checklists are maintained.

PARTNERSHIP WITH PARENTS

The parents can contact the HRT for any query regarding the class/student through the almanac, email or a phone call (between 6:00 PM to 7:00 PM).



WEEKLY PLANNER (Nursery, LKG, UKG, Class I and II)



A planner will be uploaded on the Padlet weekly. There will be a lot of announcements and dates to keep you informed. They will highlight some events that have happened in class that week as well as weekly curriculum activities, projects etc. Please read the planner shared every week.

It will also provide you with a means of communication with your child. If you have the "right "questions to ask them, you will get more than just "fine" when you ask them "How was your day?"



ENSURING WELL-BEING

When you enroll your child in our school, we assume the responsibility of assisting with your child's school adjustment and growth and development.



We identify their strengths and support them in making those all-important "next steps". We ensure that your child is cared for every day by our exemplary staff who are enthusiastic and motivated to creating a nurturing, safe and stimulating environment. SCHOOL TIMINGS

We encourage children to reach school on time. Children who are late may not adjust as quickly to the group/class.

SCHOOL UNIFORM (Nursery - Class II)

The school uniform of Early Years consists of:

Summer Uniform:

Pink t-shirt, blue track pants, blue socks, black shoes (with velcro), blue turban/patka for Sikh boys & blue bands/clips for girls.

Winter Uniform:

Pink full sleeves t-shirt, blue track pants, blue hoodie, blue socks, black shoes (with velcro), blue turban/patka for Sikh boys and blue bands/clips for girls.\

All items belonging to your child should be clearly labelled with their name.

ATTENDANCE

Regular attendance is necessary for children to benefit from our provision of Early Years experiences.

Absences should be reported to the school as soon as possible. In case of an emergency, if you need to take your child during school hours, a request should be made in writing to the Headmistress and the HRT.

SNACK TIME



Please pack a nutritious tiffin that consists of healthy options such as cheese, crackers, cereals, toast, fruits and vegetables. Please avoid giving chocolates/toffees daily to control the sugar intake, as sugar hampers the growth of the child.

BIRTHDAYS

Parents are requested not to spend lavishly on food, presents, etc. on a child's birthday as it interrupts the normal routine. The school celebrates the birthday of each child and in the class special prayer is said. At the most parents are requested to send not more than a sweet or two for the children of the class. Anything more than this is not desirous



MEDICAL INFORMATION

All parents are asked to complete the school Medical Record page in the Almanac, giving relevant up-to-date information. Parents are requested to keep the school informed of any changes. If your child needs medication then you must discuss this with the HRT/Class Teacher.

Unwell children should not attend school. If your child becomes unwell at school either you or your emergency contact will be notified. The first aider will determine if the child is distressed and if it is necessary to call the parent to collect the child.

FIELD TRIPS



Throughout the year, we will be taking several field trips. Some of these may be walking trips on campus or in our community. Others may require bus transportation. You will always be notified in advance and you will be signing a consent form for any planned field trips. We would also embark on 'virtual trips' around the world.



TRANSPORT

- 1. Non-bus users:
- Parent pick up (Gate no. 2)
- Van pick up/drop (Gate no. 1)

All parents will submit an undertaking if they decide to use private vans. This undertaking has to be renewed every year. Parents must verify/certify the driver's details and countersign the ID proof and license. For security reasons, entry into the school is restricted only to authorised persons or parents. The school does not take responsibility for private vans.



2. Bus users:

If your child is to go home with any adult other than yourself, written permission along with a photo or a brief description of the person must be emailed to school each time.

AUTHORISATION TO PICK UP CHILD

Dispersal Card- Please fill in the identity card and paste photos of the people authorised to pick up and drop off your ward. Parents, please ensure that the authorised person carries the dispersal card. We must have written notification a day before with the authorised before we can allow this change.
